Therefore, by killing him, Annie would end up with full control of the plantation and slaves, and on top of it, the freedom to do whatever she wants at the firm. Besides, Annie had become very tough on slaves and used some as her lovers for

her gain and end up killing all of them. Therefore, the author managed to give a reflection of death and manipulation as a tool the main character used in her quest for change, freedom, and equal responsibility to control a property.

After the death of Annie, the slave felt like it the ideal time to acquire independence, but that wasn't even close to happening (Motz, 2018). Her spirit wouldn't let them have anything for their own, and Annie would still be in control of the plantation. Her spirit was let loose by the botched Voodoo that was supposed to keep her closed in her tomb forever. Now her spirit was out and was in control of the property. She could be seen riding her horse going around the plantation, making sure everything was okay just like she used to do when she was alive. Also, sometimes, she could be seen standing on her bedroom balcony by her slaves. The bedroom balcony has a frightening history that none of the slaves would try to relate to or encounter (Nordhus, 2020). Every morning, she used to take to her bedroom balcony to witness the torture slaves who were reluctant to be submissive to her. Therefore, the presence of her spirit on the balcony spreads a quiver of fear to the slaves and in return, remains submissive to her even in death.

Also, the context of the novel takes place during slavery, and the acquisition of thousands of slaves and a plantation was a great sign of wealth. After the death of her husband John Palmer, all the wealth was under her control. She owned over 2000 slaves and the great Rose hall plantation meaning she was wealthy (Motz, 2018). However, to keep control of everything that happens within the plantation border, she depended on Voodoo the black magic as a means of carrying out her desires and effortlessly have the full control of the plantation. Therefore, she used magic to manipulate people that come her way, ranging from husbands to the slaves, which made it easy controlling the large plantation and its inhabitants.
